WHAT WILL YOU LEARN IN THIS MAJOR?

The major in Emergency Services Administration (ESA) provides a foundation in fire and emergency services, with related courses in management and administration. The major prepares students for careers in leadership in fire services, emergency management and emergency medical services administration. Specific content addresses emerging issues including incident management, communications, responder health and safety, and coordination of uniformed services. Students select from one of these three specializations, supported by a common core that integrates fundamental principles of emergency services. A capstone course brings students from all three specializations together for an integrative research project.

IN THIS MAJOR YOU WILL ■■■

Identify and test core mechanisms of emergency services administration in the public, non-profit, and private sectors.

Categorize and catalog emergency services and evaluate them in light of public, legal, and legislative policy.

Design and construct emergency services plans and adopt policies consistent with professional standards which serve the common good and diverse constituencies.

Analyze specific situations relevant to emergency services, applying and evaluating appropriate responses.

Compose and compile data, documents, and reports as well as other operational materials essential to agency mission and purpose.
